Wrapping Around Adoptive Families



Daily Prayer Calendar

The easy-to-use prayer calendar on the next page will help you and your family remember to pray for kids in need of forever families—as well as the churches, agencies and partners involved in the process.

Instructions:

Print one calendar per month, then fill in the month and days in the blank spaces provided. Hang the calendar on your refrigerator or mirror to remind you and your family to say a special prayer each day.

Supplies Needed:

- Two hands for prayer
- Caring heart for orphans
- A place to hang the calendar

Children come into the United States foster care system for various reasons, including neglect, abuse, abandonment and substance abuse by their primary caretakers. Historically, the church has cared for children such as these out of obedience to God's repeated mandate to care for the marginalized. However, many Christians today are simply unsure of what they can do to make a difference.

The National Foster Care Prayer Vigil was created to call followers of Christ wherever they are to ask the God of the Universe to do great and mighty things on their behalf. He hears our prayers, and we know He will answer our plea for these precious children and for the people who love and care for them.

Perhaps the best place to start is on our knees, crying out to a Holy God on behalf of these children, their birth families, their foster families and their social workers.

Prayers within the calendar are from the "Foster Care Prayer Guide" by the Cry of the Orphan collaborative campaign.

Instructions:

Be a Blessing

Just because you can't bring a child in foster care into your home doesn't mean you can't make a difference in their lives! There are countless ways to be a blessing to kids in foster care. Volunteering, donating and encouraging others are only the beginning of your journey to bringing smiles to the faces of waiting kids in your community. Working with your local human services division or other licensed child placing agency is the best way to get connected. For more information on agencies and ministries in the your area, click here.

Creative ideas and activities for the whole family to get involved!

- Pray regularly for the kids in foster care, the social workers in your city and the judges and caseworkers that are making decisions on behalf of children and youth (see page 6 for a helpful guide).
- Volunteer at your county's child welfare office.
- Clean up the playground at the county child welfare office.
- Surprise county child welfare staff with baked goods or lunch once a month.
- Create and donate "care" bags with items such as toothbrushes, soaps, shampoo and something comforting—a hand-knitted blanket or small stuffed animal.
- Donate items such as cosmetics, hygiene products, pre-paid cards for music downloads, or new or gently used books to local group homes.
- Host a "drive" for in-need kids' items like backpacks, books, toys, games or art supplies. (Ask your local contacts what they need!)
- Encourage teens to get certified to provide babysitting or respite care to kids in foster care. Work with your local child welfare office or licensed agency to do this. (This is easy for adults too, not just teens!)
- Volunteer to be a mentor to a child in foster care.
- Offer to take a group of kids to a local matinee. Ask about discounts and specials for non-profits/community members in need.



But at any given time, there are over 100,000 children waiting in foster care for a permanent family—a home to call their own.

Adoption Requirements


Find out what your state requires before beginning your journey. When considering adoption of any type, the most important first step is prayer. If after praying you are interested in adoption from foster care, the next step would be to determine whether you meet your state's requirements.

Some basic requirements:

- At least 21 years old
- Own or rent your own home
- Have adequate financial resources to maintain the home
- Can provide for the child's physical, mental and character development
- Have parenting experience or none at all
- Already have children in your home or not



Choosing an Agency

A good adoption agency can be a great asset in helping you and your family through the adoption process, but not all agencies are licensed to do all types of adoptions. How do you decide which one is right for you?

Adoption is a lifelong process for parents and children, and it is important to choose an agency that can help you assess your readiness to adopt and that has the expertise to help you through the process. Child placement agencies must meet the licensing standards to provide adoption services in their state. A personal evaluation prior to selection of an agency will generally lead to positive results for families.

There are more than 100,000 legal orphans waiting for families in the United States.

The following points may be helpful in choosing an agency:

1. Learn about adoption and the issues involved

- · Read books and articles on adoption
- Attend an adoptive parents' group
- Talk to other adoptive parents

2. Determine the type of adoption you feel called to pursue

- Infant or older child
- · Domestic or International
- Special needs (emotional challenges, mental or physical disabilities) or minimal challenges

3. Contact the agencies and learn about their programs

- Ask about any requirements/restrictions on adoptive parents such as length of marriage, age, etc.
- Ask for brochures on their program
- Attend orientation/information meetings

4. Evaluate the agency's program (some good questions to ask)

- Ask about the steps in the agency's process such as orientation, application, study, parenting classes and the estimated time frames involved. Make a list of special questions you want answered.
- Make sure the agency is licensed; ask when was the last time the agency was visited by a representative from the licensing unit.

- Find out if complaints have been filed against the agency and if so, how they were resolved.
- Find out the staff's education, background and experience in adoption.
- Ask about the services the agency gives to birth parents and evaluate the completeness and sensitivity of this work.
- Learn the costs involved for the screening, orientation meeting, home study, supervisory visits, court reports, educational groups, services to and expenses in connection with birth parents in designated adoptions, extra work in connection with interstate placement and other possible expenses. Obtain written detailed information on all costs involved including the agency's policy on refunds.
- Ask about any support groups the agency facilitates and any post finalization services they might offer.
- If possible, talk to other adoptive parents about their experience with the agency.

5. After you have chosen the agency

- Keep in regular contact with the agency but be realistic with the staff's time.
- If you have a complaint or are dissatisfied, talk honestly to the person with whom you are working and, if this is unsatisfactory, than talk to the director.



"When emotional, psychological, behavioral or learning difficulties arise with children who were adopted or in foster care—especially children with a history of neglect or abuse—the problem is nearly always rooted in or related to issues of attachment. That's because kids from hard places tend to be disconnected kids. In negotiating conflicts and impasses with these children, parents need to understand that the ultimate goal is to draw them into a circle of safety and security, disarm their defenses and help them reconnect."




